Event Recap



In celebration of Earth Day on Saturday, April 20, 12 volunteers cleaned

three miles of Earney Road and half a mile of Batesville Road off Hwy 140. A total of four students from Etowah High School (Eagle Service Connection) and eight adults from the community came together and collected 38 bags of litter, 17 of which were from the half-mile of Batesville Road.

On Saturday, April 27, a group of friends and neighbors of the Ball Ground Garden Club cleaned Hightower Trail. This was their first cleanup, and they are excited to adopt the road. This first "deep clean" yielded 22 bags of litter plus miscellaneous large items.

From the Recycling Center

If you are a current customer of the Cherokee County Recycling Center at some point over the past six months you have been turned away due to the center being full. This has been frustrating for us and our customers as the volume of material being brought to the center has exceeded our capacity.

Unfortunately, we have had a handful of customers who have given up on recycling due to the limited time our containers have been available for use.

We have recognized and responded to this need and now have a second compactor running at both our Blalock Road and Hobgood Park locations to accept single-stream recyclables.

This expansion will reduce the capacity closures, but it will not eliminate them. We are still dependent on a third party to haul the containers, and we estimate that the current volume of material being brought still exceeds the abilities of this expansion.

These facility upgrades are a stepping stone toward our ultimate goal of building a processing center. A processing center will give us control of the material and eliminate the need for a third party. We will actually process and market the material thus eliminating capacity closures and keeping the generated revenue in our county.

We are thankful for our customers and appreciate their patience through these growing pains. Our job at the Recycling Center is to provide a service so we share the frustrations when we are unable to do so.

We look forward to the new additions and what it will provide our customers. For those who have given up recycling we hope the added

infrastructure will bring them back again.
