DAILY UPDATE

- The Georgia Department of Public Health has announced 772 confirmed cases of COVID-19 across the state.
- 25 deaths have occurred in the state as a result of COVID-19.
- Cherokee County has 20 confirmed cases of COVID-19.
- All Cherokee County funeral service providers will limit funeral service attendance to 10 people until further notice.
- Commission Chairman Johnston has issued a Local State of Emergency Order to suspend county ordinances prohibiting the sale of unopened/uncorked bottles of beer and wine by “consumptions on the premises” license holders through April 30, 2020; and for other purposes.
- District 1-2 Public Health is conducting drive through specimen sample collections to test for COVID-19 cases at the Woodstock Public Health Office. This site is now listed as a Federal Collection Site. Individuals eligible for testing are listed below:
 - Individuals 60 years or older, that are symptomatic, will be eligible for testing. These individuals must go through their healthcare provider to receive a referral and their Person Under Investigation number.
 - First responders and healthcare workers who are symptomatic and non-symptomatic. These individuals must go through their healthcare provider to receive a referral and their Person Under Investigation number.
- The Georgia Department of Public Health has established a COVID-19 hotline, if you have any general questions. This hotline will also answer testing specific questions. The hotline number is 844-442-2681.
- The Cherokee County School District will continue to distribute to-go bags of food to students in need every Monday through April 6, 2020. A child, infant to age 18, must be present for a bag to be provided. These bags will contain a week of breakfasts and lunches for a child. Please visit the CCSD website for locations where to-go bags will be distributed.
- The Georgia Department of Public Health advises that the risk to the general population of Cherokee County remains low.
- There are more than 20 vaccines currently in development. One of these vaccines has recently went into human trials. Realistically, a vaccine will require approximately a year of trials and testing before it could be available to the public.
- Until a vaccine is ready, several experimental treatments are underway. Anecdotal evidence suggest that these treatments could be effective against COVID-19. The FDA is in the process of approving other drugs to use in the treatment of COVID-19.

- We ask that citizens of Cherokee County continue to practice the preventative measures outlined in this update.

- Must Ministries in Canton is a drop off location for canned food items 7 days a week/8:00 AM-4:00 PM.
- Local parks and trails remain open to the general public. Please utilize the following guidelines for park use.
 - Follow CDC's guidance on personal hygiene prior to heading to parks and trails — wash hands, carry hand sanitizer, do not use parks or trails if you have symptoms, cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing, etc.
 - Self-clean any equipment such as playground equipment or benches prior to your use and wash/sanitize hands immediately after use.
 - Observe at all times CDC's minimum recommended social distancing of six feet from other people. Practice it and know what it looks like. Keep it as you walk, bike or hike.
 - Warn other trail users of your presence and as you pass to allow proper distance and step off trails to allow others to pass, keeping minimum recommended distances at all times. Signal your presence with your voice, bell or horn.
 - Note that trail and park users may find public restrooms closed — be prepared before you leave and time outings so that you are not dependent on public restrooms.
 - Bring water or drinks — public drinking fountains may be disabled and should not be used, even if operable.
 - Bring a suitable trash bag. Leave no trash, take everything out to protect park workers.

The citizens of Cherokee County are resilient and have always stepped up to meet any challenge. We are all in this together!

- Local State of Emergency to suspend county ordinances prohibiting the sale of unopened/uncorked bottles of beer and wine by consumptions on the premises license holders through April 30, 2020; and for other purposes.

PREVENTATIVE MEASURES

- Wash your hands often with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Stay home when you are sick.

- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

- All residents of Georgia are encouraged to have a plan in place to care for and protect family members who are elderly or have compromised immune systems. Check on neighbors who may be elderly or have a heightened risk of contracting the virus.
